Excellent reunion; the best ever for me! Looking forward to the 60th, and I hope the format of it will follow the 55th's.

Fine time. Well organized and well worth the time, energy you all out into it. The hotel seemed remote & an odd choice. You all could do Better than that.

My reunion experience was mediocre. Very few people I knew attended.

I experienced sticker shock. Had my wife and I attended all functions we would have paid more than I paid for a year's tuition as a student (granted these are not constant dollars, but the total bill, excluding transportation and hotel, was excessive). We limited our participation to a day and a half, skipped paying \$150 to attend a welcoming reception and met offsite instead with some close friends from the class.

I had a fine time, as I always do. I can't think of anything in particular to criticize. Those who planned the event--classmates as well as alumni association staff--worked hard and did all the rest of us a great favor. It's good to do a survey like this, but sometimes one can over-intellectualize a topic. The small details aren't so important. The overall spirit of the event is. At this stage in our lives we can hardly be unaware that the clock is ticking, and so the opportunity to share memories and friendships from the past becomes more and more meaningful with each successive reunion.

Somewhat disappointing. Classmates I knew are either deceased or chose not to attend. Given the comparatively few persons I knew compared to the 50th, I question whether I'll attend again. We were seated on the Lowell House dinner evening with two members of the reunion committee. They had been roommates at Harvard and have remained good friends ever since. My wife and I were non persons both at dinner and also when we happened to encounter one of the couples outside the tent on the final evening. I didn't expect a warm "hello", but I think common courtesy would have called for at least a brief acknowledgment. Clearly, we're not part of the Boston group. However, being on the reunion committee did not include any effort to reach out.

I love reunions. I love seeing what has happened with everyone, and reconnecting with people. I love the memorial service, revelling in the old places, commencement, discussions. I was very depressed after this one, though. I was on the reunion committee and I thought: when we plan the 60th, 2-3 of us who have bantered, jockeyed, praised, criticized and laughed and worked with each other will no longer be on this earth. That's 2-3 out of 30. Sad, no matter what; terrifying, as I could be one of those 2-3.

I was deeply moved by my classmates and what they have done for the people they have served. The reunion solidified my belief that a Harvard education is simply the best there is. I plan to continue contributing to Harvard to help maintain this level of quality. The reunion turned out to be a major factor in this decision. I was also overwhelmed by the presentation on the

new Fogg. I was pleased that it was Topm Lentz, the Fogg Director himself, who spoke to us. This guy has a vision that is unparalleled. He is making the Fogg as good as the best museum in the world AND he is making it the absolute head-of-the-pack leader in doing what a UNIVERSITY museum should do. He and his staff are determined that they and their collection will teach Harvard students to look, a specific way of knowing that is just as important as literary and quantitative ways of knowing. They will succeed. The world will be better for it. The search committee that landed him should be commissioned to do all future searches for every post in the university. I fell into a half-hour conversation with a junior music major, who was kind enough to sing in our memorial service choir. I wanted to thank her, and we ended up talking about what she is up to, what Harvard studies are meaning to her. She told me she enjoyed the time as much as I did. I am aware of all the ways that Harvard has changed in the past 55 years, but I also think that her and my experiences had much more similarity than difference. And it was wonderful to spend quality time with the few people who came whom I did know from undergraduate days. Such fine people!

Wonderful week, despite bad communications issues. Never got texts (thought classmate who was staying with me did). Really enjoyed talk sessions.

The reunions are always enjoyable for me, especially to see those classmates whom I haven't seen in many years. I'm at Harvard/Cambridge often several times a week and I do see many of classmates at our luncheons, but the circle of friends increases during each reunion.

The reunion sponsored meals are very important for meeting and socializing with other attendees. I understand that you cannot please everyone with the selection and preparation of food, However, the venue for serving and eating the food is also important. It was generally good except for the Dunster House meal that was disorganized and uncomfortable.

The getting together with old friends becomes ever more precious. I am grateful that Harvard makes this possible.

It would have been nice to have a few drivers available to take those who were staying with classmates and friends back from evening events, but it wasn't crucial.

I am on the H-R 60 RPC and have reported directly to its members.
